OPPORTUNITY

This is a remarkable opportunity to make significant strides in one of our nation's top public gardens, at a time when University and community enthusiasm for the Minnesota Landscape Arboretum (MLA) is strong. Reporting to the Dean of the College of Food, Agricultural and Natural Resource Sciences (CFANS), the Director will have the opportunity to develop a long-term vision and strategic plan for the next decade and beyond. The plan will address all aspects of the MLA, including capital projects, horticulture, ecosystem design and management, research, education, and philanthropy all while building a diverse, equitable, inclusive, world class culture and workforce. The future of the MLA will also be focused on its financial growth that includes growing the endowment and increasing earned revenue support.

<u>History</u>: Faced with a substantial need to research plants suitable for growing and surviving in a rugged northern climate, in 1956 the Men's Garden Club of Minneapolis approached the Minnesota State Horticultural Society with an idea for an arboretum. An option was taken on 160 acres of land near the University of Minnesota Fruit Breeding Farm west of the Twin Cities, and with the help of a gift from the Lake Minnetonka Garden Club, the land was purchased in 1958 and given to the University of Minnesota for the Minnesota Landscape Arboretum.

<u>Today</u>: The MLA has seen remarkable growth since its inception and is now comprised of 1200 acres. It is ever growing and improving the visitor experience and opportunities to educate and inspire Minnesotans through its plant collections with display gardens, horticultural research, programs, and 155 art collections. In the coming years, several major projects – funded through a generous private gift – will relocate the MLA entrance, create new visitor welcome areas, enhance safety, protect the MLA's assets, and create opportunities for further expansion. Philanthropy will continue to determine the pace of further development.

The Director will be expected to build on the vast support it has from the MLA Foundation Trustees, staff, donors, the broader communities of Minnesota and the University, and will be dedicated to expanding the MLA's outreach through the development and execution of innovative educational programs and direct community engagement. The Director will explore opportunities to extend the current constituency of supporters and participants by engaging individuals who represent a geographically, racially, ethnically, and socio-economically diverse base. This individual will be expected to guide and participate directly in fundraising for priority initiatives, while maintaining a focus on strengthening interdepartmental relationships and activities.



RESPONSIBILITIES

Administration:

- Serves as the chief administrative and executive officer of the MLA
- Possesses leadership vision and ability for long-range planning to build and facilitate growth in public engagement, education and research programs, and staff development
- Provides direct leadership for all aspects of operations, development, research, education, human resources, horticulture and finance
- Communicates effectively with staff, faculty, students, University administration, surrounding community stakeholders, donors, and public and private partners
- Interfaces effectively with the Minnesota Landscape Arboretum Foundation, which is the chief fund-raising organization for the MLA programs, maintenance, endowment and capital expenditures to guide growth and development
- Fosters diversity and inclusion within the MLA staff and their constituents
- Oversees the development of strategic plan, business goals and objectives that will increase revenue, identify and develop business opportunities and expand the Arb's presence and brand
- Oversees overall budget and financial activity results for all operations. Compares the results with objectives then selects a strategy that will provide measures to correct unsatisfactory performances and results
- Collaborates with University of Minnesota Extension to deliver on University's land grant mission through education and outreach, including the Master Gardener volunteer program
- Serves as the Director of the Horticultural Research Center and connects MLA's programs with College (CFANS) research mission

Fundraising and Advocacy:

- Advocates for gardens, plant collections, and physical resources of the MLA in collaboration with the University of Minnesota, the College of Food, Agricultural and Natural Resource Sciences and the Department of Horticultural Science
- Represents the MLA to public and private stakeholders and visitors to enhance visibility and grow support for new and existing programs and operations
- Sets direction and works in partnership with the Advancement Director to engage in fundraising efforts, including direct donor cultivation with local, regional, state, federal government and other granting agencies, individuals, private foundations and corporate charitable giving organizations as well as events to grow donor support
- Develops and maintains a relationship with the University of Minnesota Foundation which provides critical resources to the MLA development operation
- Supports Minnesota Landscape Arboretum Foundation advisory board members in strategic activities and allocates appropriate staff time to facilitate, train and engage the MLA Foundation Trustees in fundraising and advocacy on behalf of the MLA

- Focuses resources to raise the funds required to maintain sound operations and facilitate the strategic plan in keeping with the goals of horticultural and organizational sustainability, community outreach and engagement
- Strengthens and builds engagement across a broad set of constituents with focus on underserved communities
- Serves as a leader in national public garden and museum associations to work collaboratively in elevating the stature of the MLA
- Fosters MLA's continued outreach and engagement beyond Minnesota, through the use of technology and partnership

- Demonstrated administrative and governance ability
- Demonstrated success in past job performance
- Demonstrated interpersonal and public communication skills and public speaking experience
- Ability to forge positive collaborative relationships with diverse public constituencies, private stakeholders and business interests
- Documented competency managing complex budgets
- Documented experience with strategic plan formulation, development, implementation, and evaluation
- Documented engagement with diverse audiences

Desired:

- A proven record in arboretum and/or botanic garden management
- Professional experience in horticulture, landscape architecture or other plant sciences
- Experience leading and managing organizations with public research and education missions
- A strong understanding of scholarship as a research and teaching enterprise in an academic institution
- Significant education and experience in business, organizational management, and educational administration
- Knowledge of and experience with cold hardy plants
- Demonstrated success in recruiting, hiring, supporting, and retaining a diverse workforce

PROGRAMS

The Minnesota Landscape Arboretum features programs for all ages and interests:

- The Horticulture Research Center, an important research arm for the U of M's Department of Horticultural Science, advances knowledge in fruit breeding, winter hardy plant propagation, and tree and shrub development.
- The Youth Education Department offers hands-on, K-6 science standards-based school programs, summer day camps, preschool and family programs, all using plants and nature as inspiration.
- The Adult Education Department offers year-round classes in a variety of topics that connect students to MN plants and environment: horticulture, ecology, fine arts, nature photography, food and wine and the like.
- Nature-Based Therapeutics offer professionally facilitated interactions with plants, animals and natural landscapes to bring about measurable outcomes in human health and well-being. Audiences include community members, educators, rehabilitation professionals and more.
- The Andersen Horticultural Library, a non-circulating library, houses over 10,000 volumes and various other publications on horticulture, botany, landscaping, gardening and natural history, including children's books.
- Arboretum Auxiliary, a diverse group of people who volunteer time and talent to support the work of the MLA through fund raising events and other projects that benefit members and the public.
- Volunteers are people of various backgrounds and ages who volunteer their time in a wide variety of areas, from weeding and planting to fund-raising and clerical work. They work alongside staff members, learning and sharing in the activities of the MLA.
- Programs engage with diverse communities. Examples include <u>Urban Garden Program</u> and <u>The Dakota</u> <u>Sacred Hoop Walk</u>.

ABOUT THE UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA

ABOUT THE MLA

The University Of Minnesota Landscape Arboretum (MLA) is within the College of Food, Agricultural and Natural Resource Sciences (CFANS) at the University of Minnesota. The MLA is one of the top visitor attractions in the Minneapolis-St. Paul area and an important part of the culture, education, and economy of the Twin Cities and the Upper Midwest. It serves a broad audience with more than 500,000 visitors annually and 32,000 members as a beautiful in-town getaway, an escape to reflect, re-energize or plan for the future and connect with the wonders of nature. The MLA consists of almost 1200 acres of unique public gardens including 49 display and specialty gardens, 18+ miles of garden paths and hiking trails (a 1.5 mile stretch of the Highway 5 Regional Trail on property not included in this total), 44 plant collections, 6,100 taxa of plants, and 8 native and restored natural areas. World class exhibits, events, and innovative natural science and horticultural education inspire individuals of all interests and ages.

The Minnesota Landscape Arboretum Foundation (MLAF) was incorporated as a non-profit corporation in the state of Minnesota in 1970 and operated exclusively for the benefit of the University of Minnesota Landscape Arboretum. The MLAF is an independent public charity under IRC section 509(a) (1) and exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3). As of June 30, 2022 the assets of the MLAF is \$56m (Endowment is \$47.4m).

MLA, the University of Minnesota's most beautiful showcase, provides education in horticulture and landscape design, develops and evaluates plants for Minnesota and the Upper Midwest and provides enjoyment for thousands of visitors each year. Voted the 2019 Best Botanical Garden (USA Today readers), the MLA offers 1200 acres and cross-country ski trails (15+ miles of winter trails-includes cross-country ski and snowshoe trails) in winter through northern woodlands, native prairie and natural wetlands.









Placing it in the top echelon of large public gardens in the United States, MLA's current budget is \$17 million. In 2021, the MLA had a year-round staff of approximately 200. This professional staff is supported by an enthusiastic and dedicated team of more than 900 volunteers annually. The MLA is also home to the University of Minnesota Extension Master Gardener volunteer program and staff. The University of Minnesota Extension Master Gardener consists of 2,700 active master volunteer gardeners who share U of M horticultural expertise in almost every county of the state of Minnesota. The program partners closely with the MLA.

One of the MLA's greatest strengths is its close ties to faculty research, teaching, and Extension activities in the Department of Horticultural Science. Faculty within the department have released over 100 cultivars of cold-hardy fruit and landscape plants with support through the Minnesota Agricultural Experiment Station and the MLA. These research programs are unique worldwide in developing fruit and landscape plants suitable for USDA hardiness zones 3 and 4.

ABOUT CFANS

U.S. News and World Report consistently ranks Minnesota the second-best state in the nation, giving it top rankings for opportunity, natural environment, infrastructure and health care.


St. Paul and Minneapolis have a strong economic climate with a highly skilled and educated workforce and among the lowest unemployment rates of the country's large metro areas.
